The Monroe One BOCES Urban-Suburban Interdistrict Transfer Program began in



Their board and community unanimously adopted a resolution, and in March 1965, they welcomed 24 students to West Irondequoit.

Today, we celebrate the 14 suburban districts that have opened their doors to students from the City of Rochester, with over 900 students currently enrolled. As we look forward to a promising future with our largest graduating class of 94 seniors this spring, we are inspired by the hundreds of Urban-Suburban alums who have built remarkable careers and pathways, showcasing the transformative power of this program.

The Family Pledge

Alumni Spotlight

Shawn Turner

A good education is essential. A *great* education is what Shawn Turner and his wife were looking for when they moved back to Rochester from Florida in 2021. Shawn is an Urban-Suburban Program graduate from the West Irondequoit Central School District, and he wanted his daughters to have the same kind of experience he did. Spoiler alert: they're on their way.

Shawn's journey with Urban-Suburban started in the late 90s. His older siblings were all going to city schools at the time, but his cousins had just gotten into Brighton Schools through U-S. Shawn's mother wanted to give the Program a try and see how Shawn would do. She applied, and he started at West Irondequoit in fifth grade.

"Initially, I wanted to follow where my older siblings were going. Just because it was natural for me," Shawn said. "But once I was exposed to some things that I just wouldn't have been exposed to, I realized pretty early on that it's a special program, and I would have access to people and to things that I just wouldn't have access to in my normal life."

Shawn built lasting relationships with students and staff at West Irondequoit who helped him to think beyond what he thought was possible for his future.

"As a result, I ended up going to college. I own and run a tax and accounting firm. I also own and run a construction company. And I don't know that I wouldn't have done those things, but I know that Urban-Suburban is a very integral part of who I am, and it allowed me to be where I am today."

Fast forward to today: Shawn's daughters, Ava and Nova, are following in his footsteps. Nova is at West Irondequoit, just like her dad, and Ava is in the East Irondequoit Central School District.

"When we moved back from Florida, we wanted to be closer to family. But the move wasn't going to happen unless we knew the girls could get the same level of education they had in Miami," Shawn shared.

The family applied to Urban-Suburban, waited, reapplied, and waited again. Eventually, Nova got into kindergarten at West Irondequoit. A year later, Ava was able to leave the private school she was attending and start eighth grade at East Irondequoit.

"She's made great friends already, and I know those



connections will keep growing," Shawn said. "This program gave me so much. I wanted my kids to have that too."

Through his experiences, Shawn has learned a lot—and he has some advice for both alumni and current students.

For alumni: "I think it's important for people like myself and others who have gone through the program and have benefited from the program to come and pour back into the program so people understand that it is important." Take Shawn and his daughter Ava, for example—they've graciously shared their stories for the Urban-Suburban 60th Anniversary celebration!

For students: "Get involved and make friends. Friends that don't look like you, friends that don't talk like you, friends that have different religious backgrounds and political affiliations. Just make friends. My real estate attorney is someone who I went to high school with, my realtor is someone I went to high school with, a couple of my partners and clients, my roofer. So, you know, join, make friends, get involved, and have fun."

Student Spotlights


August Anderson

Our Urban-Suburban Science Team students have been hard at work—and it paid off! In January, they competed in their very first STEM competition as a team and did an incredible job. This talented group is made up of Urban-Suburban students plus two new faces from Spencerport. Welcome, Matthew and Andrew Woodbine!

Led by U-S alum Kelvin Knight, the Science Team trains at Coach Knight's alma mater, the University of Rochester. Starting in September 2024, the team dove into a semester of FIRST LEGO League (FLL) training. They explored science history and facts through campus tours, STEM field trips, and hands-on activities like programming robots and building FLL challenge sets.

This year's FIRST LEGO League theme was Oceanography. The students learned to build and program a LEGO SPIKE Prime robot, then took on the challenge of researching microplastics in the ocean. They even wrote and delivered a full presentation on the topic!

On January 19, 2025, the team competed in the FIRST LEGO League Regional competition, holding their own against tough competition. The students will continue their STEM journey through June 2025, bringing this year's experiences to next year's Urban-Suburban Science Team.


Jacob's extensive experience and leadership have been valuable assets as she begins her work with the district.

Applications are Open for Summer Youth Employment Programs

(Monday, Feb. 3, 2025) – The City of Rochester and Monroe County invite area youth, ages 14 through 20, to apply for the City's Summer of Opportunity Program (SOOP) and the County's Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP).

Administered in partnership with RochesterWorks, these programs offer 6 weeks of paid internships for students who are currently enrolled in middle school, high school, or actively pursuing their high school equivalency diploma. Program participants learn skills that prepare them for the workforce and academic success.

The application period will remain open until all job and internship opportunities are filled. Youth are encouraged to apply early. Applicants must be at least 14 years old by May 31.

Upon completion of the application, participants will have the opportunity to interview for paid summer jobs and/or internships. Past participating employers have included the City of Rochester, community organizations, colleges, and local businesses.

The application process requires students to submit the following documents prior to the deadline: A work permit; social security card; a school report card; and official photo I.D. (such as a school I.D., driver license; non-driver I.D., or a Safe Child I.D.).



The applications process can be started without submitting the documentation.

To facilitate the process, program administrators will hold four in-person document drop-off events from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., Feb. 18-21 and April 17; and 2 to 6 p.m., March 6 and April 15 at the Loretta C. Scott Center for Human Services, 57 St. Paul St.
